Harden existing critical facilities.	Flood	No	A new 72" penetration was constructed through the levee to minimize the possibility of flash flooding of the Charlestown Road Flood Control pump Station's ponding area. Clarksville Fire station #3 is located within the 500 year or .2% floodplain of this ponding area. Fire Stations #1 and #2 which had outlived their usefulness have been replaced with more secure facilities.
Community outreach and education.	Flood	Yes	Outreach and education is being done by means of the semiannual newsletter distributed to each residence within the Town of Clarksville and by placing FEMA brochures in the Clarksville Branch of the Jeffersonville Township Library along with various Town offices.
Training and support of storm watcher teams and emergency personnel.	Flood	Yes	Clarksville's emergency personnel continue to complete the FEMA required incident management training with the Clark County Emergency Management Agency.
Sanitary sewer construction and separation.	Flood	Yes	Although the Town of Clarksville does not have any combined sewers like so many other municipalities. The Town does have an ongoing program to replace old sewers which suffer from infiltration and can cause basement flooding.
Storm drainage improvements.	Flood	Yes	In 2008 the Town of Clarksville invested in a comprehensive drainage study of all of the known locations where flash flooding occurred. This study laid out various mitigation options for each of the 9 areas selected. Since the original Council approval of the document the Town has completed all of the items to be mitigated at a cost of over \$12M. Currently funding is in place to update the 2008 drainage study.

Buy-outs of flood prone properties.	Flood	Yes	The Town of Clarksville has completed the buy-out 1 property on Silver Creek Drive and 7 properties on Walnut Grove Road using local and Hazard Mitigation Grant Funds from FEMA. All properties have been purchased, demolished, and ground surfaces restored. Several of the structures were used in fire training by multiple departments. Buy-outs of flood prone properties will remain a high priority program as future flooding is likely.
Address bank erosion on Ohio River near McAlpine Loch.	Flood	Yes	Although several meetings have taken place between Town, State and Federal officials. No progress has been made to secure funding to mitigate this problem. Portions of Harrison Avenue have subsided and become impassable and is now permanently closed at the IDNR boat ramp.
Replace Flood Control pump station at Cane Run Creek.	Flood	Yes	The replacement of this pump station is nearly complete and should be operational near the end of January 2023
Replace Flood Control pump station at Mill Creek.	Flood	Yes	This is still a high priority project for the Town of Clarksville however, no avenue for funding has been Identified.
Install positive closure capabilities for all levee and floodwall penetrations	Flood	Yes	This was added to the 2022 Plan following a couple of instances of failure of flap gates to close properly in past flood events. This is listed as a high priority although now funding source has been identified.
